In that way, we start to talk about raising the expectations and standards up again, as we come to the final few terms. This could be applied to all classes! The children have made great progress from their starting points so far this year but with continued focus and high standards we can already start getting ready for next year! This is where the relationship between school and home is so important –please set the high standard by continuing to make sure the children rehearse the basics that are much needed: please continue to read every night, rehearse number facts and times tables and learn a few spellings- not much to enable your children to be ready for the next year and to be Flying High! Visit from Luke Hall MP by Martha and Will Year 6. Today we had a visit from Luke Hall MP, because we are learning about democracy and how we can make a difference to our world. We gave him some ideas about new bills that he could pass on to the House of Commons such as: tidal power, more pay for teachers and police and greater funding for sports facilities in our local area and more money for hospitals. Before we shared our ideas, he talked about how laws become laws and the different places in parliament for example the House of Lords and House of Commons. He also told us that the MPs in the House of Commons sat on green benches to remind them of grass as many of them used to be farmers. The House of Lords seats are red because they are expensive to dye and the most expensive seat is purple for the monarch. It was good fun

listening to him and he also did a role play with, Toby from Year 5 the Prime Minister and Kai from Year 3 the King!

Heads Peer review day: As part of our ongoing school evaluation on the last day of last term, we were visited by two head teachers and two senior leaders, who went on a learning walk around our school to look at the quality of our reading provision. We have made significant investment (a huge thank you to



FOSH for this) in Read Write Inc and also made a number of small tweaks to our Guided Reading provision in Key Stage 2 classes. Following the great work that our reading subject leaders Mr Adams and Miss Paul have done, we wanted the head teachers to look at the impact of this work and the impact of teaching the new reading schemes. It was a good morning and we were left with lots of positive comments. As always there are a few things to work on but we were pleased with the outcome



of the written report. Alongside all the great work that the staff do in school, one thing that will also continue to benefit your children and that is your time to hear them read every night! Please find time every night after school to read for at least ten minutes a day! Just this week I have seen these children loving their reading - choosing to read on the playground at lunchtime. Reading is the key!
