Global Curriculum:

As part of our partnership with St Mary's, we have looked at the design and intent of our curriculum and have built our new curriculum around a Brave Change markers concept, where children think about how they can make a difference in school and the wider community. Our Global Curriculum Theme for this term across the whole school is Social Justice, where throughout our curriculum topics and lessons we weave in key questions such as "What does fairness mean?" and "What does it mean to be treated unfairly?". The children will discuss the global theme, at an appropriate age related level, alongside their curriculum objectives. Next Friday (17th January) we will be giving out our new curriculum overviews for this term that will show this more clearly, which will also contain some of the key vocabulary that the children may be using throughout the topic.
