As part of this strand we have devised a 'Catch Up strategy' which we hope will enable all children to receive some additional time with adults in school. Schools have the flexibility to spend their 'catch up' funding in the best way for their cohort and circumstances and it is our belief that QFWT (Quality First Wave Teaching), which the children receive everyday in the classroom, will enable the children to make good progress from their starting points, alongside some small group intervention work. The first trench of additional funding is already being used in school to provide additional phonics interventions across KS1 and Year 3, Maths and Reading support in Year 4, Curriculum support in Year 5, and Maths support in Year 6.
