Skills

• The Stone Age Period is said to have started around 3 million years ago when humans started to live in Europe. The Stone Age was followed by the Bronze Age period. This is when humans started to use metal.

- The Bronze Age was followed by the Iron Age when tools and weapons became more advanced and were used for farming.
- During the Palaeolithic (Old Stone Age), man gathered food by hunting wild animals and birds, fishing and collecting fruits and nuts.
- During the Neolithic Age (towards the end of the Stone Age), the humans formed settled communities, and domesticated plants and animals for the first time in history.
- Inuit lifestyle today bears little resemblance to that of their grandparents.
- North America is a continent in the Northern and Western Hemispheres.
- Some areas get scant precipitation and are classed as polar deserts.
- Alaska is the largest state in the US, however its population is sparse. It has 24 hour daylight during the Summer months and 24 hour darkness during the winter.
- Human activities have had a negative impact on climate change.
